I am now resident in Camden. I have attended numerous cultural events at the centre over the past five years. The LIC runs a broad programme of cultural events that caters for all tastes and age groups. It attracts writers and musicians of the highest calibre. It maintains a library of books of Irish interest that is probably without peer in Great Britain. The LIC also carries out very important social work for older and more vulnerable members of the community. Its work ranges from lunch clubs for the elderly to providing clean clothes and a shower for the homeless. It also provides advice and assistance on social security and housing. This aspect of its work is genuinely awe inspiring. It represents the best of the Irish spirit in looking out for those who need a helping hand. The LIC also provides office space to other social enterprises, including the Catholic chaplain to Irish prisoners. The LIC occupies an important place in the Irish community in London and in the UK. It is the embassy for the ordinary people providing a forum for Irish people of all ages and backgrounds to come together. It is situated in what remains one of the strongest Irish communities in London. Its long term survival is important to the Irish community and the vulnerable (of all nationalities) who rely upon its services. I am familiar with the LIC's current premises and was given a tour of the buildings last year.
