Request for Tree Works at 4 Netherhall Gardens, London NW3 5RR

Many thanks for your swift response. Please see below the Tree Works I would like to carry out. This is part of a general garden refurbishment after some 17 years, aiming to reduce overcrowding, plant more proportionately and, in places, reduce apparent subsidence risks.

Front garden:

- REMOVAL: Two large fir trees (appear to be Thuja Occidentalis (Fig. 1)), within 4-5 feet of the house; there is pathway cracking, plus re-emergence of cracking of interior plasterwork. The trees are now greatly disproportionate to the small front garden.
- REMOVAL: One Cabbage Palm (Cordyline Australis) (Fig.2), approx. 20 feet high, some dead upper branches and crowding with other plants.
- 3. PRUNING HEIGHT AND BRANCHES BY HALF: Two large fir trees (appear to be Green Leylandii (Fig 3)), again within a few feet of the house, disproportionately large, with nearby pathway cracking (previously fixed) also re-emerging. [Note: without discussion, the neighbouring college recently cut these trees back on their side of the fence, which comprises a roadway to their car park].

Rear garden:

- REMOVAL: Mimosa (Acacia Dealbata) (Fig 4). Removal due to potentially dangerous lean (about 45 degrees) and immediate proximity to the house (within 4-5 feet).
- REMOVAL: Large (approx. 20 foot) palm (Trachycarpus Fortunei) (Fig 5), now disproportionately large and close to house.
- REMOVAL: Three Cabbage Palms (Cordyline Australis) (Fig 6 and Fig 7), all approx. 20 feet plus tall, and overcrowding with other trees/plants.
- 7. PRUNING BRANCHES BY A THIRD: Large **Sycamore Tree (also shown in Fig 6)**, required occasional pruning of upper branches.
- 8. PRUNING HEIGHT AND BRANCHES BY HALF: Large fir tree (appears to be **Green Leylandii (Fig 8)**), alongside the Sycamore.
- REMOVAL: Elaeagnus (Fig 9), to facilitate more diverse planting (more a large bush than tree, but just to be sure)
