State of the art technology will facilitate the opening and closing of the gates, hands-free by remote control, both from outside and/or from inside the houses. The design of the gates is minimalist, stylish and have been custom designed in consultation with the Design Out Crime police team. They will be far from looking oppressive or :prison-like. Being set so far back from Princess Road, they will not impose visually on the streetscape.

It is difficult to understand why anyone should attempt to deny the residents a facility which they clearly voted for, and which will provide the sense of security so many have so long wished for.
