				The photograph on page 10 of the Heritage impact assessment document Fig 4 (mislabelled Fig 1), is misleading.  It does not show the view from Parliament Hill. It is a view of part of Parliament Hill.
				Here is a view of Haddo House from the slopes of Parliament Hill.

				View from Glenhurst Avenue
				Images 1a and 1b from the Photo Montage pack are also misleading.  The company hopes that the works will be 'camouflaged by the colour of the building' and the 'bright backdrop of the skyline'.

				Community Consultation The Site-Specific Supplementary Information and Design Access document on pages 1 and 2 states that consultation letters were sent on 22nd November 2019. This appears to be referring to planning application 2020/1456/P which was rejected. There has been no consultation for this application. The company seems to be assuming that there was no need to consult the community (not even the residents

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				of Haddo House), perhaps because nothing much has changed-just a 'tweak to sector 3'. If this is the case, they must also accept that all the previous objections still stand. That includes the petition of more than 60 residents of the estate who registered their objection.  As before, we are presented with this during 'lockdown' making community discussion hard.

The application 2020/4559/P closely resembles the earlier application 2020/1456/P which was rejected.  2. ANY addition to the roof would be visually harmful and harm the character of the building.  As suggested by Nathaniel Young - Camden¿s Planning Officer
				¿The application site is a relatively high residential block of 7 storeys which is surrounded by low level housing along Gordon House Road, Highgate Road, Chetwynd Road and Glenhurst Avenue. As a result of this contrast between the height of the host property and the low level neighbouring properties, and the setting of the host building with open space surrounding it, the roof of Haddo House is clearly visible in short, medium and long range views from a variety of vantage points including Parliament Hill. Therefore, even if the equipment and antennae were to be located into a more discreet position in the middle of the roof, they would still be very prominent and would cause unacceptable visual harm to both the building and local area¿.
				3. Choice - the majority of residents have already expressed their objections and this needs to taken into consideration.
				4. I have concerns regarding 5G on the impact on health and the environment, results are inconclusive irregardless of the apparent scientific data that backs up the applicant. Currently, there are 2 judicial reviews in process and until the findings have been fully examined we urge the council to prioritise the safety of its residents.

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
