## Assessment

The s.211 notice is for the removal of a cherry tree from the rear garden and pruning of a sycamore, an oak and a pear tree in the front and rear garden of a residential property that is situated within the conservation area.

The cherry tree is of low visibility from the public realm and is not considered to significantly contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area. The tree is likely to be self set, which does not automatically reduce the value of the tree but in this instance has resulted in the tree growing in position between the boundary wall and what appears to be a shed which is unsustainable in the medium/long term.

The sycamore tree has been pruned in a similar way historically, what is proposed is essentially repeat works. The oak tree and the pear tree are of low visibility from the public realm and are not considered to significantly contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area. Both trees have been reduced historically. The proposed pruning is considered to be of an acceptable level.

The Council does not object to the proposed works.
