CAAC/Local groups* comments: *Please Specify	 CRASH submitted an objection, summerised below: We object to the felling of two mature poplar trees. These poplars form part of a "dense continuous tree band" identified in the "South Hampstead Conservation Area appraisal and management strategy". That strategy states that "The conservation area generally has a decent level of tree cover which should be protected and enhanced where possible". In addition it states "Views along rear garden vistas and into areas of dense tree cover are characteristic of the conservation area and should be protected". In line with this strategy permission for felling should not be granted as it is not in line with the strategy. It is noted from the photos that the trees have not been regularly maintained and it would be preferable to apply for permission to pollard/maintain the two poplar trees if the owners are concerned about "health and safety" (no claims of perceived or actual subsidence are made). CRASH does not object to the felling of the pear tree as its condition is noticeably poor; however it would be preferable to plant a replacement to ensure the benefits of green vegetated areas in the Conservation Area are maintained - it is noted that this has already been reduced by use of "astroturf" in the garden rather than lawn/turf. 									

Assessment

The s.211 notification is for the removal of two poplar trees and a pear tree from the rear garden of a residential property that is situated within the South Hampstead Conservation Area.

The Council follows the Planning Practice Guidance on tree preservation orders as part of the NPPF when determining s.211 notifications

All three trees are of minimal visibility from the public realm and are not considered to significantly contribute to the character of the conservation area. The trees are not considered to provide a high level of amenity to the public.

The poplar trees have grown between older, more broadly spreading trees in close proximity to each other. This has resulted in the poplar trees becoming etiolated because they are not afforded the space they require to achieve their potential. Major unions of both trees are covered by ivy however it is considered highly likely that there are v-shaped unions and tight forks that are not visible from ground level which reduces the safe, useful life expectancy of the tree

The pear tree has a large wound on the stem and is in poor structural condition.

The three trees are not noteworthy examples of their species or are of a rare species. The trees are of no known cultural or historical significance.

The Council has no powers to add conditions when determining s.211 notification, relating to replacement planting or otherwise.

It is not expedient for the Council to serve a tree preservation order to protect the trees.

The Council does not object to the proposed works,
