				As the owner of the adjacent property (no. 3 Oak Hill Park Mews), which is situated immediately to the south of the application site, I am extremely concerned that if this roof terrace is allowed, it would adversely impact the amenity that we currently enjoy in the property, through increased noise, decreased privacy and potential for overlooking.
				My property, located in the same residential mews as the applicant's property, is the direct neighbour to the south. We are in a much lower position to no.4 in the mews, at the bottom of a small 2 metre hill, which already puts our house at a height disadvantage with no.4, making it appear to loom over us. The proposals, including a glass balustrade that will add to the perceived height of the mews property (which is already overbearing), will make the applicant's property even more oppressive.
				We are also only 5-6 meters away from their property and their proposed roof terrace. The use of the roof terrace would lead to a detrimental loss of our privacy as not only would the terrace overlook our entire garden / outdoor space, but anyone using the terrace would be able to 'peer' down into our garden space as it is directly in front of the applicant's house.
				The Application includes a Noise Impact Assessment which assesses the impact of noise from the roof mounted plant, but we are further concerned by the potential increase in noise from the use of the roof terrace, especially during evenings and late nights.
				Furthermore, the use of the roof terrace would lead to a detrimental loss of our privacy for the whole of the mews as it would directly overlook most of the communal garden space providing no opportunity for privacy for any of the mews residents.
				I have sent you this same objection letter via email with photos showing the view that the applicant will have of my garden / outdoor space and how the proposed roof terrace would impact the communal mews garden, so that you can see how it will overlook both spaces and we will lose privacy.
				We believe the proposed development would fail to meet the requirements of Policy A1 of the Camden Local Plan as it would not protect the amenity of neighbours. The terrace would cause visual privacy, noise and potential overshadowing impacts on our living space which would be harmful to the enjoyment of our home.

				As the owner of the adjacent property (no. 4 / 4A Oak Hill Park), which is situated immediately to the west of the application site, I am extremely concerned that if this roof terrace is allowed, it would adversely impact the amenity that we currently enjoy in our property, through increased noise, a decrease in privacy and potential for overlooking.	
				Our bedroom, located on this side of our property and which is approximately 5 metres away from the proposed roof terrace, currently benefits from a window that faces out onto the flank wall of the application property. The proposals include a glass balustrade that adds to the perceived height of the mews property which becomes more overbearing to us. The use of the terrace would also lead to a loss of our privacy as users would be able to 'peer' down into the bedroom window, and this will occur often as the new staircase leading up to the terrace, appears to be in line with our window.	
				The new roof terrace will also provide the occupants at 4 Oak Hill Park Mews with the opportunity to overlook our entire garden, which will also lead to further and detrimental loss of privacy. I have sent you this same objection letter via email with photos showing the view that the applicant will have of our bedroom window and how their roof terrace would overlook the whole of our garden so that you can see what I am describing.
