				I and many of the Belsize residents have transitioned to working fully remotely from home (I will not be returning full-time to the office) and these are the grounds of my objections:
				1) I suffer from asthma and in recent years my condition has worsened partly attributed to the air quality in London. School Runs have transformed our roads into essentially a highway during peak drop-off times. I am very concerned about our poor air quality when 60+ additional pupils will be absorbed into local rush hour; this will cause a ripple effect on existing multiple school runs within Belize/Hampstead so I sincerely believe it will exacerbate my condition and deteriorate our local environment further.
				2) The noise pollution will affect my current home office productively. My nerves are already frayed from the spate of drilling in Wedderburn Road as new Fibre cables are laid. Our communal garden adjacent to the school (separated by a small boundary wall) has been an oasis to recharge during our intense working days. I will have no respite once this work commences. The sound will travel well beyond our garden and add further stress to my working day.
				3) To expand on point 1 but to focus solely on the traffic question (air pollution aside). There are days when just trying to drive from our Belsize forecourts to Fitzjohns Avenue (mere meters!) can take close to 20 minutes. Adding the load on the current traffic stream in Belsize Lane will only make this untenable situation worse (no doubt many more large SUVs will be clogging up narrow roads). Parents, delivery vans and commuters alike, in desperation have begun using our private driveway as a throughway to avoid some of the traffic, regularly speeding in our rear drive (by the garages) where often toddlers are playing or riding scooters. Those who don't live here ignore the one-way system adding considerable danger to our children (as well as residents) who live in Belsize Court.
