Although Fitzroy Park is a private road, it is heavily used by people making their way to and from Hampstead Heath. The group of trees, T1-T7 provide screening for the house which is set back and below the road. It would be useful if the applicant had provided clearly marked photos and an indication of the effect of the proposed works. It would seem that the verdant nature of the corner of The Hexagon would be destroyed, exposing the house behind. It is true that the houses further down the hill have paved forecourts with formally planted isolated trees, but this house is part of a separate development and it is not apparent that it would be architecturally consistent with them, were the 'front' be landscaped in a similar way. The applicant, who seems to have bought the house recently, has given no indication of whether they intend developing the house, which is highly likely and no indication of any proposed landscaping. This house marks the beginning of a treed area on the right hand side of the north eastern section of the road. To fell the trees, or reduce them so drastically would materially alter the streetscape.
