#### Climate Change/ Global Warming

It is very bad for the environment to demolish a building that could be reused. The Travelodge is only 55 years old; all the concrete, steel and energy used to make it will be wasted. Putting up a massive new building uses lots of new concrete, steel and energy. Very tall buildings need a lot of energy to heat and light. The world cannot cope with this behaviour, it contributes significantly to overheating and climate change. Camden has an agreement to act in a sustainable way that will prevent climate change. This proposal goes against those commitments and is irresponsible and unsustainable.

### Our unique neighbourhood

There are lots of lovely and protected buildings nearby; this new building will be totally out of character with the area. The old buildings are protected by being in 'conservation areas' including Bloomsbury and Covent Garden. Camden are supposed to make sure the conservation areas are looked after. Local residents, workers and tourists want to be somewhere beautiful and unique not next to yet another office block tower that could be anywhere.

#### Height

The proposed building is far too big and bulky, nearly the height of Centre Point! All the other buildings in the area are lower than this. Any replacement building should be the same height or less than the existing one.

### Homes

There are not enough homes for people in our area. Camden's planning policies require LabTech to include some housing. Their proposals contain a pitiful number of homes and most that they are including are private and not low rent.

# Offices

They propose to build over 250,000 square feet of offices. We already have too many offices in this area, most of which are lying empty. Now that many people work from home due to the changes made by Covid we don't need so many offices, so why build more?

## New safety Issues in the area

LabTech's proposal includes a new, unnecessary narrow alley they have called Vine Lane, to run between West Central Street and High Holborn. Because it runs North - South it will be in shadow most of the day. It meets High Holborn, a 3-lane, busy road and bus route with no immediate crossing point. The resulting alley will be dark, intimidating and a draw for illegal activity.

# Open Space for workers

There is not enough open space for the number of workers expected to use this massive building. A few shrubs and benches are offered on shady,

				Design and setting

It is hard to imagine a structure that would be more incongruous in this historic setting than the one which Labtech is currently proposing to build. The reality for people living and visiting the area will be the inescapable presence of a vertical, bulky structure, 2/3 the height of Centre Point, on a main N/S route linking Bloomsbury with Covent Garden, looming up over the area, significantly intruding on views from St George's Bloomsbury, the British Museum and other key vantage points, including from the historic open spaces such as the Bloomsbury and Bedford Squares. The sheer height of the structure means it will encroach upon so many aspects of the area, making it impossible to avoid and it will be experienced as a constant eyesore at street level, destroying the harmony of scale which has been maintained over several centuries.

I live on Bury Place which is a key approach to the British Museum. The street is lined on either side by late Victorian mansion blocks which were clearly designed to respect the scale and Classical stylistic elements of the earlier Georgian periods, fitting in well with the earlier period buildings and adjoining grid of streets. Given that so much care has been taken over many generations to observe and enhance the character of the area, it is inconceivable that this could be undermined at a stroke by a cynical move on the part of an uncaring developer to create an enormous, speculative office block, especially at a time when working patterns have changed, post-Covid.

The plans put forward for the redevelopment of Nos10-12 Museum Street, 35-41 New Oxford Street, and 16A-18 West Central Street block are also insensitive to the quality of the original design and will harm the setting of the two listed properties on West Central St. It is also doubtful whether the new Vine Lane passage will contribute anything of significant value, being narrow and overshadowed and likely to attract anti-social activities.

Environmental damage and pollution

There are already policies in place such as in Camden's Local Plan to promote retrofitting over demolition wherever possible as part of an enlightened approach to reduce carbon emissions and promote energy efficiency. Demolishing Selkirk House would contravene this policy and undermine confidence in the Council's ability to commit to its own key policies.

Local residents have already had to endure noise and pollution fallout from a number of large developments over the past decade, notably from the former M.O.D building, Commonwealth House and the Post Building.

Many of us, additionally, are experiencing other types of pollution both from traffic build-up on the main roads such as New Oxford St and High Holborn and from vehicles diverted to residential streets as part of recent traffic 'control' measures. In July 2019, South Bloomsbury TRA independently carried out measurements of nitrogen dioxide and we were alarmed to discover the highest reading at the junction of Bloomsbury Way and Bury Place was 83.19 micrograms/m3, over twice the recommended levels stipulated by the World Health Organization. We should not be required to put up with further unnecessary concentrations of pollution over the 4-year period it is estimated to take until the works are completed. For residents living close to the site, the noise and pollution will be unbearable.

# Housing and community needs

Considering there is an established housing crisis, the number of homes proposed as part of this development, particularly in relation to social housing, is ludicrously small and does not seem to comply even with the minimum which is stipulated for a development of this size.

South Bloomsbury has thrived on account of the mix of residents from different backgrounds and family types which we believe contributes to the vitality of the area and creates a sense of being part of a distinctive neighbourhood. Traditionally, the area has been home to artists, actors and writers which has given it a somewhat bohemian character. However, we have witnessed how high private rents have forced out many of the younger generation as well as smaller independent businesses and consequently, the continued existence of such a mixed community is under threat.

None of the large sums of CIL monies which have been paid to Camden resulting from planning permission being granted to these large developments has yet been allocated to our community to help redress some of the problems which undermine its stability and well-being; we are simply expected to put up with successive environmental nuisance and disruption without any consideration of the impact it has on the quality of our lives. Apart from genuinely affordable housing, there is a long-standing community wish list of adaptations which would improve life for people, including modifications to the local GP surgery to permit disabled access, converting our roofs to green spaces and providing double glazing to save energy and provide insulation from the noise on the streets below in this frenetic part of central London.

## Consultation

On account of the magnitude of this development proposal and the level of disruption this will cause for local residents, we would have expected an extended and meaningful consultation process with the developers. However a zoom meeting held with them in April of this year which was initiated by the community itself, only served to illustrate how little the developers were prepared to engage with us over our understandable concerns.

# In conclusion

Considering the vastly inappropriate height, bulk and design of this proposal which will cause irreparable damage to the historic buildings and streetscape, as well as environmental damage and pollution, I strongly appeal to Camden not to grant planning permission for this application.
