



Officers may not consider large box dormers on the rear roofs of Victorian houses to be the most refined of architectural features. However the fact remains that no matter how they got there, they are a very common roof feature in this and all the surrounding streets. They are now so prevalent as to have become an intrinsic part of the roofscape and the local vernacular. Almost too numerous to count, the inclusion of a box dormer on our design, if (as it has been), it can be demonstrated that I causes no harm to any neighbouring amenity, weighed against the scheme as a whole, should not be grounds for refusal.
