Assessment

The s.211 notification is for the removal of horse chestnut tree and pruning works to a sycamore tree in the rear garden of a residential property that is situated within the South Hampstead Conservation Area.

The pruning works to the sycamore are considered minor in nature.

The horse chestnut is a poor quality specimen, of low amenity value and of minimal visibility from the public realm.

The works are considered not to be harmful to the character and appearance of the conservation area.

Low amenity value is considered to be a robust reason for the council not to object to the works in accordance with the Planning Practice Guidance on tree preservation orders as part of the NPPF.

It is not expedient for the council to serve a tree preservation order to protect the trees.
