The Belsize Village Business Association was established in October 2018 as a community service project of Belsize Village-based social care provider Penrose Care Ltd and Belsize Village beauty salon Pivoine Ltd to revitalise Belsize Village which had sustained continued economic decline over a number of years through to 2018. The overarching aim is to boost Belsize Village's economic vibrancy sufficiently so that all local businesses are able to pay their workers the London Living Wage like Penrose Care, the pioneer of ethical home care in the UK and one of the first home care providers in the UK to become an Accredited Living Wage Employer. This is to provide a reachable goal of building a community that durably respects human dignity and strives to pursue the common good.

Predominately through the use of innovative marketing initiatives, the project led to a substantial increase in footfalls to Belsize Village and as of about October 2019, has been hailed as a success. The association boasts the active participation of most of the businesses in Belsize Village. Our success sadly came to a halt in March 2020 when the COVID-19 lockdown measures severely harmed the local economy. Positively, on July 4, 2020, the association launched the Belsize Village Streatery which permits alfresco dining on Belsize Village terrace square for local hospitality venues which on the 2nd weekend of operation (July 11, 12) boasted 100% occupancy throughout the days. The success of the Belsize Village Streatery led to a comprehensive revitalisation of Belsize Village and garnered Belsize Village's first ministerial visit in modern history, eliminated environmental blights that mired Belsize Village for over 10 years, saved over 100 hospitality jobs, increased the number of Accredited Living Wage Employers in Belsize Village, created a new town centre in north London that did not exist prior to the Coronavirus pandemic of 2020-21, and prevented any business losses in Belsize Village during the Coronavirus pandemic and in fact led to the addition of two new businesses. In February 2022, the Belsize Village Streatery became the first scheme of its kind to be made permanent in British history.

The association has over 30 members, has no membership fees and its legal entity is the Belsize Village Estate CIC. The association has two volunteer co-coordinators, Aya Khazaal and Robert Stephenson-Padron, who aim to direct community initiatives across the business community through consensus and voluntary participation

# **Background of Clean Belsize Village**

The Belsize Village Business Association's Clean Belsize Village initiative consists of two elements that developed out of its efforts to organise and manage the Belsize Village Summer Streatery which commenced July 4, 2020: 1) developing a temporary and hopefully a permanent solution to the historic recurring rubbish mound that had blighted the top of Belsize Village terrace square for 10+ years and 2) developing a long-term solution endemic flytipping and littering which has long mired Belsize Village.

# Section 1: Eliminating the Historic Rubbish Mound on Belsize Village terrace square and fox leakages

According to Amit of Lexington's in Belsize Village, Belsize Village has suffered from a long-standing recurring rubbish mound on Belsize Village terrace square for at least 25 years (it has been widely confirmed it has existed at least for 10 years). The rubbish mound is caused by accumulated rubbish from residents, businesses and random fly tippers who had historically placed rubbish on the top of the village square. Due to frequent missed rubbish collections from Veolia, the rubbish mound would at times stay on the square all day long, staining the ground black and filling the square with a putrid smell. The mound looked like this but at times could be significantly larger:

In June 2020 and early July 2020, Robert Stephenson-Padron, co-coordinator of the Belsize Village Business Association, and Nicky Ezer, head of events of Camden Council, worked successfully together to clear the historic rubbish mound as it would have prevented the Belsize Village Summer Streatery from commencing on July 4, 2020 due to the putrid smell the mound emanated and the fact that it blocked key counter-terrorism mechanisms of the event: the heavy wooden planters.

### **SOLVING THE RUBBISH MOUND**

1. Sometime on the week of June 29, 2020, at the behest of Nicky Ezer, council waste enforcement officers visited various business venues informing them to start leaving their rubbish against the

wall along the square where the Bambi street artwork is located rather than the top of the square as this was far enough to ensure that on a day a collection was missed, people would not be able to smell the rubbish on the main square. Further, it was a pathway wide enough to sustain the rubbish.

- 2. On July 3, 2020, Nicky Ezer sent out a team to deep clean the square. The result was the black stains from the historic rubbish mound were removed and the square turned from a darkish black / grey colour to a vibrant orange-ish colour. It is amazing to see!
- 3. On the same day, Robert Stephenson-Padron concluded a waste collection service from First Mile whereby they would make site-wide collections <u>picking up all rubbish</u>, <u>regardless of bin bag or rubbish type</u> from 11pm-12pm each night. Veolia customers (Roni's, Village Pharmacy) has their rubbish taken away 7pm-10pm by Veolia. The first collection of the new service was passed midnight on July 4/5, 2020 and the morning of July 5, 2020 marked the first day in many years that you could wake up in Belsize Village and not see the rubbish mound.
- 4. On July 5, 2020, the Belsize Village Business Association put laminated notices up around the village to instruct locals how to abide by the new waste disposal system. This was following an email from a local resident saying that residents were still fly-tipping in front of SPOT. Since a few days after posting these notices and promoting awareness on social media, compliance with the new system has been almost 100%.
- 5. Currently there are two commercial collects to our communal bins: 7-8am by First Mile and 9-10pm by First Mile.

### **SOLVING FOX-INDUCED RUBBISH LEAKAGES**

- 6. On July 13, 2020, The Belsize Village Business Association secured the price of a further improved system to eliminate fox-induced rubbish leakages whereby:
  - First Mile on July 15 supplied three eurobins and a fourth came shortly after.
  - If we wish to eventually buy the bins, they are £300 (ex VAT) outright. There was demand from local residents for us to paint any bins we procure for the village. Following obtaining planning permission on March 22, 2021 for bin covers, the BVBA painted the bins magnoli to match the background wall.
- 7. Although planning permission was obtained on March 22, 2021 for our proposed bin covers, planning's decision to only grant 12-month temporary planning permission made spending over £15,000 on the proposed bin storage structure imprudent and therefore it has not yet been built. However, in December 2021, local councillors of Frognal and Fitzjohn's ward approved a £20,000 CIL grant to build the structure which is pending Camden Council planning to make the decision which is supported by our local community by an overwhelming amount via consultation (88%) making our bin structures permanent. This consultation involved a site notice on the 25/11/2020 and the consultation period expired on the 19/12/2020. A press notice was advertised on 26/11/2020 and expired on 20/12/2020.

### What we do to mitigate issues when they arise with respect to the four eurobins on Belsize Terrace

The bin system has the following main challenges:

- 8. **The bins are visual blights.** To mitigate this in the interim we have painted them to match the background wall. However much of the paint has come off and we need to repaint them. The best long-term solution is to make our bin covers planning approval (2020/4413/P) permanent which would eliminate the visual blight the bins cause and enhance the conservation area by adding more greenery to the village and ensuring the historic rubbish mound does not return.
- 9. **Residential and builders flytipping.** To mitigate this issue, we have a legally-compliant CCTV system. We report any cases of flytipping on the Love Clean Streets app.
- 10. **Overflows and leakages:** The porters of the various hospitality venues are supported by five Clean Belsize Village volunteers, mostly local residents, who periodically check the four bins, sort out overlows and clear litter as soon as spotted. Litter and cleaning equipment is stored nearby at Roni's Bagel Bakery.
- 11. **Missed collections:** Missed collections had not been an issue 2020-2021 although they have become an issue in 2022. As of April 4, 2022, we have had 8-morning waste collections missed in 2022 vs 3 missed collections for the whole of 2021. In each of these 8 occasions, one of our Clean Belsize Village volunteers or venue porters eliminated any resulting visual blight by tidying overflows, reported the missed collections and the 7am-8am missed collections were collected 11am-1pm. BVBA also continues to work with First Mile to resolve whatever is causing their recent spike in missed morning collection.

Note it would be ideal if the Belsize Terrace street sign is moved to above the BT utility box.

# Section 2: Bin the butt / Anti-littering campaigns

On Thursday, July 9, 2020, the Belsize Village Streatery closed early due to rain. As a result, the event manager, Robert Stephenson-Padron, led a surgical clean-up of Belsize Village spanning parts of Belsize Lane, the bottom of Belsize Crescent, Belsize Terrace square and road, and Belsize Place (historically the most filthy part of Belsize Village). It yielded a huge amount of cigarette butts:

In response, the Belsize Village Business Association began raising awareness of the toxic plastic pollution from cigarette butts on three of its social media platforms (stats as of 16 April 2021):

- Our @belsizevillage Facebook account which has over 700 followers
- Our @belsizevillage Instagram account which has over 4,500 followers
- Our @belsizevillage Twitter account which has over 4,300 followers

Physical notices were also put up in the village:



On the same night the surgical litter pick-ups began (July 9, 2020), the Belsize Village Business Association communicated over Twitter with Cllr Adam Harrison, the Cabinet Member for Improving Camden's Environment, and were made aware of the #binthebutt campaign after which we used the campaign name to promote our cleanup efforts of the cigarette butts and indeed, varied litter, around Belsize Village. The results of the environmental clean-up campaign were swift and effective. By the morning of July 13, 2020, there was a significant reduction in cigarette butt pollution solely through social media communication / marketing.

Below you will see the successive decline in cigarette butts collected from:

- Belsize Lane (McCrone Mews to Belsize Mews)
- The bottom of Belsize Crescent
- Belsize Terrace square and road areas
- Belsize Place (the area historically most filthy in Belsize Village along with the top of Belsize Village terrace square)



### Increasing the number of Camden Council public waste bins to reduce cigarette butt pollution

On July 13, 2020, Roberto Molinari of the Street and Environment Enforcement team of Camden Council, made contact with Robert Stephenson-Padron, co-coordinator of the Belsize Village Business Association offering assistance to Clean Belsize Village. Notably, Mr. Molinari requested the areas where public waste bins should be placed to help reduce the toxic plastic pollution of cigarette butts. Following are the locations the Belsize Village Business Association is recommending for the placement of new public waste bins with cigarette disposal facilities. Due to an embargo on new litter bins, the new bins were never placed.

# **Section 3: Current challenges**

- Securing permanent planning permission for communal business bins which will allow us to get funding for the associated bin covers.
- Continued high levels of littering mainly from smokers and parents/children (candy wrappers, popsicle sticks).
- High levels of residential flytipping from residents between 64-72A Belsize Lane, 50-60A Belsize Lane and Belsize Place
- House-based residents not putting all waste in bin bags which causes waste to blow around the community.
- Still occasional issues of residents putting bags out at night (especially persistent at 54 Belsize Lane).

#### BELSIZE VILLAGE AN EXEMPLAR OF COMMUNITY REVITALISATION

In the last year, Belsize Village has been transformed thanks to businesses and residents working hand in hand. This renaissance can be traced back to the foundation of the Belsize Village Business Association (BVBA) in 2018. The BVBA is a voluntary organisation made up of local businesses. Members are not charged fees, it is run by volunteers, and its sole purpose is to promote and improve Belsize Village.

Last summer, with funding from local councillors and incredible resident volunteer power, the BVBA created a beautiful space for the whole community. This culminated in the fantastically successful Streatery, which helped save several businesses and over 100 local jobs. We plan to relaunch the Streatery on April 13, 2021, following overwhelming support from our community noted in multiple consultations. Historically, Belsize Village has been marred by multiple closed shops, but through the collective efforts of the BVBA and the community, Belsize Village will soon celebrate having no vacancies for the first time in recent memory.

The BVBA also aims to make Belsize Village the cleanest town centre in Camden. For over ten years, a large recurring rubbish mound had sat atop the village square, blighting Belsize Village and deterring footfall. The BVBA working closely with the community to remove the rubbish mound, jet-washed the pavement, and installed new garden planters – adding beauty and security to the village square. Further, a communal commercial waste collection was created with four bins that are emptied twice daily. These bins, although not perfect, have helped end the problem of foxes tearing the bags and leaving the streets strewn with rubbish. Our original clean-up has been followed by ongoing litter reduction campaigns and volunteer litter pickups.

The importance of this community-wide teamwork has been demonstrated in recent weeks. When roadworks stopped routine waste collections happening, the old fly-tipping problems resumed. But thanks to proactivity by community volunteers and a direct relationship with First Mile through BVBA, the problem was brought under control and the streets have now returned to being clean. Under the old approach, similar issues would persist for weeks or months.

We are proud of Belsize Village's revitalisation, as is most of our community. As local businesses, we are grateful to residents for their support and fully endorse the BVBA's efforts to make Belsize Village the most attractive town centre in the borough.
