Summary of consultation responses:	 The Council received one objection: This tree probably predates the building of Somerset House it is not on that property but in a neighbour's garden there are many mature fruit trees in the surrounding gardens and they are part of a historic orchard that predates the building of the houses. It is criminal to cut down a mature tree in a conservation area at a time when we are trying to combat global warming with a government policy of widespread tree planting. This time of lockdown has shown us the importance of nature in our immediate environment for our wellbeing and mental health. I realise that there is an ongoing subsidence problem at No 31 due to clay shrinkage and being built on a steep slope. I do not therefore object to the felling of the cherry and Elder trees. 						

Assessment

The s.211 notice is for the removal of a cherry tree from the front/side garden of the property and a elder tree from the rear garden of a residential property that is situated within the Dartmouth Park Conservation Area.

It is alleged that trees are contributing to subsidence related property damage.

While both trees are visible from the public realm, neither tree is considered to significantly contribute to the character and appearance of the conservation area.

Neither tree is considered to be a noteworthy example of its species or is of any known cultural or historic value.

While combating climate change is a consideration when determining s.211 notices, in line with the planning practice guidance on TPOs as part of the NPPF it is a secondary consideration.

The Council does not object to the proposed works.
