				The main issues caused by this premises continue to be noise and obstruction.
				Please see our letter dated 30/09/21 in response to application ref. 2021-4674-TC, which outlines the
				problems along with photographs.
				These problems have continued for the past year and we ask that you do not approve this unsatisfactory situation for yet another year.
				In summary:
				1. These premises are in the heart of a densely residential area. People attending a drink-led venue like Escapologist, with the best will in the World, can't help but cause a high level of noise, which rises and is amplified so as to enter the windows of all the flats opposite, above and nearby. The noise of putting tables and chairs away inside is even louder and should not take place late.
				2. Local businesses no longer have a need to take over the street to recover after the pandemic. The area is now far busier than it was before Covid-19. However, residents do need their basic needs met in a way that has been neglected for several years now. This means a need for quieter streets and space to park and have deliveries made, rather than the space being used for commercial activity during every waking hour.
				3. The barriers are very thick and heavy. We understand from the police that this is for protection. This means that the area that is occupied goes well beyond the parking bays marked on the street. The barriers therefore obstruct the centre of the street. Yet many deliveries need to take place to premises opposite - including the Cambridge Theatre, the events space at 40 Earlham Street, Seven Dials Club at 42 Earlham Street and Red Bull at 44 Earlham Street. When their delivery vans draw up they have a choice: to stop and block the traffic or to park illegally on the pavement and prevent safe pedestrian passage. The pavements are constantly impassable.
				We therefore ask you to refuse this application.
