## Various locations on the public highway in the London Borough of Haringey

Proposal:

Installation of street furniture comprising pairs of 76mm diameter steel tubes (poles) linked with 1.6mm clear nylon filament and similar street furniture to delineate a local Jewish Eruv Drawing Nos: See LB Haringey planning application ref HGY/2022/1906

The Council, as a neighbouring planning authority, has considered your request for observations on the application referred to above and hereby raises no objection.

Informative(s):

1 Reasons for no objection-

Three of the sites are on Hampstead Lane and Hampstead Lane forms the boundary between LB Haringey and LB Camden.

A pair of 5.5m high 76mm diameter poles with wire between is proposed off Hampstead Lane to the east of Park Flats; two separate 5.5m high 76mm diameter poles with wires crossing Hampstead Lane are proposed at and to the right of the junction with Stormont Road; a 5.5m high 76mm diameter pole with wire connected to two lamp posts is proposed at the junction with Bishopswood Road. A similar application in LB Camden (2021/3105/P), for the installation of poles with clear wire between, in 10 different locations on the highway in N6 and NW5 postcodes in Camden, was granted planning permission subject to a legal agreement in April this year.

On balance it was considered that the poles and connections would not harm the townscape and heritage assets of Camden, the amenity of any residents or any biodiversity and transport conditions.

The LB Haringey proposals would similarly not have any adverse effects on the Highgate Village Conservation Area, the Listed Kenwood House, the amenity of any local residents or any biodiversity or transport conditions in Camden.

Thus no objection is raised to the proposals as far as they relate to the Camden borough.
