I realise that the date for submissions passed on Dec 10th but I am submitting my objections as I've been told informally that the deadline has been extended. I object to the proposal on the same grounds as I objected the last time this plan was put forward.

The planned installations will overshadow the Dartmouth Park Conservation Area, a neighbourhood where residents and the council have taken care to maintain the environment in recent years.

What is the point of paying attention to detail in our area, replacing limestone paving stones on our streets, as the council has done, looking after every tree, and checking on the size of our garden sheds, only to allow the construction of an industrial-scale electronic plant in our midst?

The proposed installation will loom large over our homes, over the lovely St Mary's Church and break into the skyline. Views from Hampstead Heath, so precious to the thousands of people, will be compromised.

Separately, I wish to record a complaint that I was not informed of this application even though the council has a duty of care to residents with respect to planning applications.
