				This is an historical site which adds to the environment for the local community. As part of the agreement to the development of Kidderpore Hall (renamed as Hampstead Manor) public access was given, the site is Local Green Space (LGS6 Redington and Frognal neighbourhood plan).
				The developers have already felled 36 trees and the SINC has been lost, this request to fell a further 4 trees will add to the negative impact on bio-diversity, air quality and local amenity.
				Quality of Application
				The report by Indigo makes no reference to the conservation area, Redington and Frognal Neighbourhood Plan or NPPF.
				Para 170 of the NPPF states that Planning policies and decisions should contribute to and enhance the natural and local environment by minimising impacts on and providing net gains for biodiversity, including by establishing coherent ecological networks that are more resilient to current and future pressures.¿
				The Neighbourhood Plan (BG1.2) reinforces the need to plant and preserve trees.
				Indigo recommendations include T20 and T5 requiring further investigation prior to felling. Has this further recommendation been completed? If so what was the result?
				It is not clear if the mature trees that will be felled will be replaced.
				Biodiversity and ecology
				Surveys carried out by Barratt (Kidderpore Avenue - The Ecology Consultancy 2012), Mount Anvil (former; Kings College site - The Ecology Consultancy 2014) and Redington Frognal Neighbourhood Forum (The; Ecology Network August 2016) demonstrated the presence of both bat roosts, bat foraging sites and; commuter routes in the area.; Has any account been taken of the impact on bio-diversity and the bat polulation?
				This is such a significant site, such an integral part of the local amenity that on the basis of the evidence provided the application should be refused.
